Kari Williams: Kathy was new to the program. '96 was her first year of teaching; I was a junior student, and I honesty remember walking into the classroom and, she was just beautiful! She dressed so trendy, and her hair was cute, and I was like, "We are so lucky that we got her as a teacher!" Trisha Wilson: I actually met Kathy in cosmetology school in 1980; became roommates.
